(Coats, suits, woolens, neckties...) "What can happen if you wash your dry cleaning in a washing machine?" (It will shrink, get ruined, lose its nice appearance...) "Where do people take their clothes to be dry cleaned?" (Dry cleaners...)
- "Why are some clothes commonly washed by hand?" (They need special care; it's quicker and more convenient to wash them by hand; to keep delicate clothes from snagging...)
 "Name two pieces of clothing commonly washed by hand." (Wool clothes, panties, panty hose, clothes of lace or other fine fabric...)
- "Why are white clothes usually not washed with colored clothes?" (They can easily become stained from colored clothes . . .)
- "What can happen to light-colored clothes if you wash them with clothes of dark colors?" (Might become stained . . .)
- "What is bleach?" (Product you add to the wash to make your white clothes whiter...) "Why do you need to be careful when you use bleach?" (Prevent bleach from getting on colored clothes and staining them, prevent bleach from getting into your eyes and causing severe eye irritation...)
- "What can you do to remove spots from your clothes?" (Use spot remover . . .)

115.2 SORTING LAUNDRY

For each wording below that is selected for training, client is shown the wording and asked: "What does this say?"

For each wording below that is selected for training, client is shown the wording and asked: "How do you need to wash a garment if its label has these words?"

Client is given garments having labels that indicate cleaning instructions — two garments representing each wash category above — and is asked to determine how each garment should be cleaned. It is suggested to use different garments each training session in order to familiarize client with a variety of label formats and locations.

The tasks below are intended for use either in the client's home using client's own laundry (preferable), or at the habilitation facility using clothes and other articles provided by the facility.
